Samuel McCall was born in Belfast in 1896 to foreman bricklayer William Alexander McCall and Elizabeth Kerr who were married in Ballygowan in 1892. In 1901 the family lived in Rhyll in Wales and by 1911 they had made their home on York Road Belfast and Samuel was the only child, his two siblings having previously died. By 1916 the family were living in Gainsborough Drive, Belfast. Samuel worked as an advertising clerk with the Belfast Evening Telegraph and enlisted with the 14th Battalion, Royal Irish Rifles on 4 October 1915. He died on 1 July 1916, on the first day of the Battles of the Somme, at the age of 19 and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial, France.

BELFAST SOMME 100

Belfast Somme 100 is a programme of commemorative events marking the centenary of the battles of the Somme, and the place of the Somme campaign within the First World War. The project will focus on the personalities and stories associated with the campaign and mark its place in the social and political history of Northern Ireland and pre-partition Ireland.

The *Belfast Somme 100* project aims to raise awareness of previously overlooked or submerged stories and personal connections that both the Somme and the events of 1916 have had with the broader history and development of Northern Ireland.

The project is run by History Hub Ulster with an Advisory Panel made up of experts in the period and community leaders. It is funded by Belfast City Council.

Somme Commemoration Parade Poppy Project 18th June 10.30am

Across Belfast

A parade to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the start of the Battle of the Somme on 1st July 1916 has been organised by the 2016 committee. Parades will leave North, South, East and West Belfast at approx 10:30am on 18th June meeting in Belfast City Centre for wreath laying. Poppies for every man who fell on the first day of the Somme will be carried by parade participants. The combined parade will then make its way to Woodvale Park for a re-enactment of the first day of the Battle of the Somme which will start around 1:30pm.

Castleton Lanterns

Images of First World War servicemen from the Castleton Lanterns Project. The Castleton Lanterns slides were found in the organ loft of Alexandra Presbyterian Church in 2013. Commissioned by the congregation of Castleton, the famous Belfast photographer Mr Alex. R. Hogg, made the slides of 'our men at the front' and were shown in December 1918 to the families of Castleton Church. They were put in a box and forgotten for 95 years. Refound, the images of men from one small community on the York Road gives us a poignant reminder of the breadth and scale of First World War Service.

First World War Poetry Exhibition

June - November in libraries across Belfast

This travelling exhibition features the poetry of local men and women and is an alternative to the war poetry which exists in the public consciousness. The poetry is 'from the streets' and tells the stories associated with the 1914-18 period and marks Ulster's place in the First World War. 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




































































LIVING MEMORY PROJECT
